Jesus calls serious bluff on what society values most: wealth, power, prestige. He flips the tables on who is truly blessed: the poor, the persecuted, the peacemakers. Jesus preaches a radical sermon that should jar us to action. The Beatitudes aren't meant to just be looked at - they are meant to be lived.

God's ways *will* prevail, no matter how far off it seems now. The call to act humbly challenges us to trust in God's almighty power.
